Introduction

The conception of this family history began quite unintentionally one warm summer evening back in 1976. I was about 23 at the time and attending the University of Manitoba. We were at the old air force base recreation hall in Gimli, Manitoba - a 45-minute drive from my hometown of Poplarfield and I was accompanying my parents to the wedding reception for my cousin Gailbreth Leduchowski.

At one point, late in the evening, I was sitting at a table with a group of people, which included my parents, Mike and Anne Ledohowski, and a small group of my father's relatives and their spouses. Not knowing exactly how Gailbreth and I were related, I asked if anybody could explain to me our connection. The Ledohowski family was large and fairly well known in the region, but I really didn't know how I was related to most of them. What was also curious to me was that there were three or four variations on the spelling of the family name in local use.

As I sit and compose the introduction to this family history, some 30 years later, I can still vividly recall its beginning. Mrs. John Zuk was sitting across from me at our table and offered to try to explain how Gailbreth and I were related. She picked up an empty cigarette package (almost everybody smoked socially back then) and tore it open. She dug into her purse for a pen, and with the willing help of others at the table, noted a handful of names on the blank inner side of the pack. She then connected the names with a few simple lines and arrows - and there it was! Gailbreth and I were second cousins. My father, Mike, and Gailbreth's father, Sid, were first cousins. Our grandfathers were brothers. I was also told that evening that there were about forty five or more other first cousins in the Ledochowski clan of my Dad and Sid's generation. I remember thinking that was certainly a lot of cousins, but didn't really think much more about it beyond that. And, concerning the family name, nobody at the table that night was quite sure why there were several different spellings.

I hadn't planned on saving Mrs. Zuk's little diagram. I was satisfied to have found out how I was related to Gailbreth - and her three equally good looking sisters. Some weeks later I found the little note. Taking another look at it, I thought maybe I'd copy it to a proper piece of paper and add in my immediate family to see how many first cousins I myself had. That was fairly easily completed. Later looking at it, I thought that to do this properly, to have something I

could share, I should try to get the name, birth date and a photo of each of my Dad's "forty-five or so" first-cousins, add the section on my immediate family and make a little family history booklet. It would consist of two family tree charts and about sixty to seventy photographs. I should easily be able to do that, or so I thought.

I had no completion date in mind and no idea how long it might take. It would just be an on-going fun thing - like a number of other little projects I always had on the go. So, over the next few years, whenever we had relatives drop by our house to visit or when the different families gathered at a social event, I would introduce myself to people my parents pointed out as relatives. By the end of the evening I'd invariably get one or two new names or birth dates to add to my booklet. I was frequently invited to drop by and look through family albums for old pictures that I might want to copy. I had bought myself a 35 mm camera a few years back and had done some 'close up' copy-work both in high school and more recently at university. Photographing the old photographs was something I knew how to do, and it was usually done right on a kitchen table using a copy-stand I made fitted with light bulbs for strong even lighting. Everybody was always friendly and obliging, and I very much enjoyed these in-home visits.

There were months and even years when little progress was made filling in the gaps in my booklet. Greater priorities occupied my youth. But when I did get a chance to meet with newly-introduced family members, the encouragement, new information and photos they graciously offered up, always seemed to energize me. Then I would invariably find the time to put a few more weeks or months of serious work on the project. I was accumulating a fairly large number of photographs and my little family history booklet was beginning to look like a large scrapbook, or more like some sort of extended-family photo album.

Sometimes someone would relate a short story about a family member to me. By far the most interesting of these stories I heard concerned the dark "secret" about the family back in Europe. It appears that the Ledochowski family was a wealthy and prominent family, with branches living in southern Poland and Austria. The family was devotedly Roman Catholic and a number of individuals held prominent positions in the Catholic Church hierarchy. About 1855 a family scandal occurred which resulted in the expulsion to a convent

and subsequent shunning of a young unwed mother by the name of Sofia Ledochowska - who had insisted on keeping her baby. Mother and young son Gregory Ledochowski eventually settled down in the town of Przemysl, in southeastern Poland. Here Sofia later married and had several more children. Over the years, there was no reconciling with the family and any thought of noble titles, inheritance or even assistance for either Sofia or Gregory was given up and long forgotten.

As the story goes, young Gregory grows to manhood, and around 1885 marries Anna Litwin. Before long they have a family of six, five sons and a daughter: Stefan, Ivan, Fedko, Petro, Mikoly, and the youngest, Katharina. In 1903 Gregory makes a decisive decision to leave the old world behind. He booked passage on an immigrant ship to Canada with high hopes of a new and better life. Within a few short weeks, the eight of them have a homestead and a very different and very difficult, new life as pioneers in the 'bush, swamp and stone" of Manitoba's central Interlake region. With hard work, slow but steady progress was made, and the family began to put down roots in their new homeland.

However, the old world connection did not quite end with that. It is said that shortly after Gregory's passing in 1925, a 'registered' letter arrived for him at the Hamrlik Post Office. It was said to have been sent by a lawyer representing Gregory's mother Sofia, who was still alive back in Poland and related something about a family reconciliation and Gregory "never having to work another day in his life". However, with Gregory now deceased, it was left to Stefan as the oldest son to travel to Poland to handle the family business. But, barely able to meet his young and growing family's basic needs, a trip overseas was out of the question at the time. Soon thereafter, Sofia herself passed away. The family inheritance also passed - into the hands of the Roman Catholic Church. The family of Gregory Ledochowski remained homesteaders and farmers in the forests and swamps of the Interlake region.

It is an interesting but possibly a tall tale, or are we some sort of 'lost' branch of the noble European Ledochowski family? This story was told to me by Anne (Mrs. Fred) Leduchowski, who related it in Ukrainian, and as my Dad translated into English and I jotted down notes. Other members of the family, including my father, said they also had heard the same story. I though it was simply fascinating.

The majority of the other family short stories told to me involved outstanding feats of strength. One, involving my own grandfather Stefan Ledohowski, had him taking the place of one of his horses, which came up lame while hauling fish crates for the Icelanders winter fishing on Lake Winnipeg. Another involved Kost Leduchowski walking down a highway in northwest Ontario carrying a police car door under his arm, to which he was handcuffed. And yet another involved Great Uncle Mike Ledochowski carrying 500 pounds of flour on his back as part of a wager with a local storekeeper. These particular short stories are related in more detail in the pages to come. I found these and the all-to-few other such stories very interesting, and they played a major role in keeping me interested in the project.

Then, sometime early in 2002, with the centenary of Gregory and Anna's arrival in Canada approaching, my cousin Leo Ledohowski of the Canad Inns hotel chain, suggested that we should organize a family reunion to mark the anniversary. I thought that was an excellent idea and set about to help plan and organize the event. I enlisted the help of a small group of distant cousins. After a year or more of regular meetings, on the third weekend of July, 2003 "The Ledochowski Family Reunion 1903~2003" was celebrated. The three day event went off, as they say "without a hitch" and was a great success. As part of the event I put up a display of most of the images and information that I had collected to that point. Plus, in the months leading up to the reunion I pushed hard to fill in what ever 'missing bits' I could. In spite of the time needed to help coordinate and plan the reunion, I nevertheless made great strides in getting more photos and basic personal information. It was about this time that I realized that a full-fledged book was now in the making.

In conjunction with the reunion preparations, I produced a Ledochowski Family website, <Ledochowski.ca> which cousin Leo offered to host on the internet using his Canad Inn's server. In addition to reunion information, the website included sections from the family history album and other family history items. At about this time both Leo and Ben Ledohowski graciously provided some much needed financial assistance to cover the growing stationary, photographic, travel and postal expenses that I was incurring. It was much appreciated and helped to keep me going.

About a year after the reunion, and much follow-up work, both hard drives on my home computer crashed, and without up-to-date backups, I faced months of redoing previously finished work. It was at this low point that I seriously considered giving up. Among the many files lost was a new and improved family website I had just completed, which included a significant number of photos from the reunion and new sections from the family book. But, as before, after some time away from it, the need to finish the project began to needle me again.

Towards the end of 2005 I decided to make one final push, a 'Polish Push' as my Dad would say, and try to get photos and information from the few remaining families who were not yet properly represented in the book. I have to admit now, it took longer than I thought I had the energy or time for, but I kept the push going and by early December 2006, at long last, it was essentially done. All that remained was to arrange for proofreading and printing.

I would like to briefly note some of the memorable visits I had with people that I would otherwise never have gotten to know so well, had it not been for this project. These include John and Anne Zuk, Mary and Mike Martyniuk, Dan Leduchowski, Helen Sawka, and Nellie Klym, - each of whom I had the pleasure of visiting several times. Other relatives that I corresponded with by mail, email, and by telephone, but never met face to face were Joe Ledochowski of Riverside, California and Judy Greenleaf of Deerborn, Michigan.

I'd like to mention another rather interesting aspect of this project. I intentionally selected and copied pictures that provided a good time span, to show people at different stages of their lives. After working with many hundreds of photos, I feel as though I've watched from afar as virtually all my relatives went through childhood, grew up, married, had families, and settled into old age. Eleven hundred photos appear in this book, but at least twice that number were copied, and probably ten times that number were examined. As a result, I honestly feel as though I personally know everyone in this book, including those that I have never even met or spoken with. Hopefully, readers will get a similar sense of this 'familiarity' through the eleven hundred images selected for use in the book.

It was sometimes quite a challenge to get full and accurate information concerning all the names, correct spellings, birth, marriage and deceased dates and locations. Despite numerous eyes and the best of intentions, some errors and typos undoubtedly exist for which I apologize. Spelling of some family names and place names also proved problematic. The spelling for "Hamrlik" was finally settled by locating an old post office registered letters book for the district, which eliminated the "Hamerlik" and "Hamirlik" versions, both of which are sometimes used locally.

And finally, on a personal note, this publication marks the completion of the second of three so-called "Memories & Photographs" projects I have been working on for most of my adult life. The first of these was The Poplarfield and District Millennium Album, published in March 2001. It was an attempt to preserve some of the colourful history and images from my home community and district of Poplarfield, Manitoba.

This, my second family history book, focuses on one extended family within that community - the Ledohowski family, (and also the Leduchowski family, the Ledochowski family and part of the Kochan family.)

My third and final family history book will focus on the lives and the times of one of the '46 1st-cousin' families that make up the Ledochowski clan. That of course, would be my father and mother, Michael and Ann Ledohowski. Work on that book is now well advanced. It should be completed, and a limited number of copies printed, with only a couple more years of work.

These personal history books are my gift to my family and community. They offer a few select memories and images from our collective past. They remind us who we are and where we came from - something I believe everyone should know about themselves.

And..., I eventually did figure out why the family name has several different spellings.



Gregory and Anna Ledochowski

The patriarch of the Ledochowski family in Canada was Grygor Ledochowski, though he initially went by the name of "Hryte", meaning Harold or Harry in English.

The family origins in Europe are not well known. Several branches of the Ledochowski family in Poland and Austria were prominent and titled families. The family was devoutly Roman Catholic, and many devoted their lives to the church, some of whom became very notable; such as Maria Teresa Ledochowska, the missionary "Mother of Africa" who was beatified in 1975: her sister Mother Ursula (Julia) Ledochowska, canonized in 2003 for her work educating and caring for children in Poland: a brother Wladimir Ledochowski. who was Superior General of the Jesuit Order in Rome (1915 - 1942). And, the youngest brother, Ignacy Ledochowski, was a general in the Polish army who fought against the Bolsheviks after WWI in the re-establishing of the Republic of Poland and who was captured by the Germans in WWII & died in the Nordhausen concentration camp (1945) There were other military heros in the family dating back to the saving of the city of Vienna from the Turks by the Polish Cavalry in 1683, a battle in which brothers Kazimierz & Felician Ledochowski lost their lives. Earlier history has the family associated with the bringing of Christianity to Poland in 975AD. For which they were rewarded with a family coat-of-arms: a golden circle containing three gold crosses on a blue background (granted from Grand Duke Wladimir of Kiev). Later, in 1457 for military service to the crown, they were granted an estate, 'Ledochow' in Wolhynia (from which the family name is derived).

Family legend has it that Gregory's mother, Sofia Ledochowska, was closely related to the titled branch of the Ledochowski family in Poland, but no documentation substantiating the claim have has been found. All that is known with some certainty is that Gregory was born about 1855 in Prezemysl, Eastern Poland, to a young woman by the name of Sofia Ledochwska. Sofia, being unwed and with child, was banished to a convent. Determined to raise the child herself, she settled in the town of Prezemysl, where she apparently found work as a domestic in the household of a wealthy family, and was able support herself and her son. She eventually married a Mr. Tzier, and they had three children together. About 1883, at the age of 27, Gregory married Anne Lytwyn. Gregory and Anna went on to raise a family of five sons and a daughter. Stefan, the oldest, was born on July 24, 1884 in the nearby town of Stubno, Poland. 'Ivan' (John) was born in 1887, 'Fedko' (Fred) in 1890, 'Petro' (Peter) in 1896, 'Mikaly' (Mike) in 1897, and 'Katharina' (Catherine) in 1898.

In 1903 the whole family, except 20 year-old Stefan, immigrated to Canada. Stefan had been conscripted into the Austrian Military and trained as a sniper. He remained in Poland until 1910 when he was discharged and finally was able to join the family. By this time his parents and siblings were well entrenched in developing homesteads in the isolated wilderness of spruce, swamp and stone of what would become the Hamrlik Postal District.

near the future communities of Poplarfield and Chatfield in the Interlake Region of Manitoba. Gregory had selected and filed claim for homestead on quarter section SE 2-22-1 WPM, five miles east and two miles south of present day Poplarfield. As the boys came of age, each in turn filed for homesteads of their own in the immediate vicinity; John in 1907, Mike in 1908, and Fred in 1909. At the time there was very little cash money to be earned in the region. Hand tools were used for all farmwork, livestock was minimal, and life was harsh and difficult.

Gregory and the older boys apparently found some paying work with the Icelanders at Arborg and Gimli and were paid with a young calf. But local work was difficult to find especially for cash money. As well, for a number of years running, older sons worked with the harvest gangs on the prairies of Saskatchewan and railway construction gangs to earn a few precious dollars, leaving the women and children to tend the farm and fend for themselves, sometimes for months at a time. Gregory also worked railway construction for three months in 1905.

The 1911 Canadian Census form indicated that "Hryte Ledyhouski" (55) lived with his wife Annie (52) and three children Peter (17), Mike (14), and Katie (12) on Section 2-22-1WPM along with Stefan (28), and Fred (21) with his wife Annie (18) all together in a single large log house'. John "Ledyhouski" (24), his wife Annie (19), and their daughter Katie (1) also lived on 2-22-1WPM, in a household of their own. The census also indicated that in the year prior, 1910, Peter and Mike each spent 26 weeks working 60-hour weeks as railway labourers, earning \$180 each for their efforts. Brother Fred worked for 18 weeks earning \$120.

Gregory's application for 'patent' to his homestead claim, dated March 18, 1912, also provides some interesting information. The homestead entry claim was filed on August 18, 1903. The family lived in temporatry accommodation in the Pleasant Home Postal District near the town of Teulon while a log house was being built on the homestead, which was completed in November 1904. Between 1906 and 1911 the land cleared for crops only amounted to 10 acres. A cattle herd was slowly built up from only 3 head in 1904 to 24 head in 1911. The patent application noted that in 1912, the farmstead consisted of six log buildings: a house, 16x30 feet in size; a 20x30 granary; a 12x16 shed; a 12x17 summer kitchen; 24x30 barn; an 18x20 barn. There was also 15 acres of fencing for a total estimated value of \$1,275.00 - after nine years of hard work.

Gregory Ledochowski passed away in his house, on the family homestead, in the summer of 1934 at the age of 69. Anna lived to be 93 years old and passed away in 1951. She spent her final years living with her daughter and son in-law, Katherine and Mike Kockan on their farm. Gregory and Anna are buried side by side in the Hamrlik Community Cemetery, not far from the family homestead.





The homestead application registering SE 2-22-1W to "Gregor Lyduchowski", signed with 'his mark'. The Dominion Lands Office interpreted the 'w' as 'ui', as subsequent department letters used 'Lyduchouiski'.

Earlier that same year, the passenger manifest for the S.S. *Assyria* clearly recorded his name as being 'Hryt Ledochowski'. It is uncertain why 'Gregory' was used on the homestead application, although it is likely that the registrar was looking for an English language equivalent. Hryt continued to be used until the early 1920s when the government's version of the name was gradually adopted in everyday use.






Many of the early settlers were illiterate, and the land agents tended to spell the name as best they could when the homesteads were registered. There was much confusion over the spelling of some family names, and even official records varied. In this case, 'Ledochowski' is of course the proper spelling, however Fred and Peter adopted 'Leduchowski'; brother Stephan settled upon 'Ledohowski'; while the remaining siblings used the original spelling.

Other land ownership maps portrayed the family name as being 'Ledechowski.' Brother Stefan had initially filed for a homestead just to the east of brother Mike's homestead on the NW 36 quarter section, but in 1914 cancelled the claim and moved to the area later to be known as the Sharpewood Postal District.





My great-grandfather, Stefan Ledohowski, has always been a man of myth for me. Dead before I was born, he has, for me, only ever existed in stories and pictures. A photo of a young man in a uniform that has stood in my parents' living room as far back as I can remember has represented the man who as a teenager lifted the landlord bodily off his horse for whipping his small brother. He is the man of family stories who then came to Canada and brought over his young wife and young son.

One of the stories that my father told me about him has always stayed with me. It is a story of strength and endurance in a Manitoba winter. Out on Lake Winnipeg, one cold, dark, winter evening, his horse carriage full of fish cracked through the ice. One horse was killed, but Stefan couldn't just leave the fish behind and let his family starve. So out on the lake, with the wind whipping around him, he hitched himself along side the other horse and pulled the carriage free, carrying food to his family in a prairie winter.

Stefan Ledochowski

Stefan Ledochowski was born on July 24, 1883, the first-born of Gregory and Anna Ledochowski's six children. In 1903 in Poland, as a 20 year old, Stefan was serving his mandatory term in the Austrian military (as a sniper) when his parents and five siblings left Poland for a new life on the Canadian prairies. Stefan was discharged in 1910 and soon after married Katharina Ryczan who was born on March 23, 1892 in Naklo, near Stubno, Poland. Their first born, Nicholas, was born late in 1910, just before Stefan left to join the family in Manitoba. Katherine and Nick joined them in 1913.

Soon after arriving in Canada, Stefan registered for a home-stead near the rest of the family in the Hamrlik Postal District, and commenced to prepare a farmstead for the family. In 1914 Stefan took a new homestead 15 miles west of Hamrlik in what would become the Sharpewood Postal District, soon after that township was opened up to homesteading. Being among the first settlers in the district, he was able to select one of the few good quarter sections in the township. With not so much as an oxen or plow to begin with, the family, which now included a second son, Michael, moved from Hamrlik to their new home in the forest.


Stefan slowly built up a mixed farming operation, and with the benefit of fertile and relatively stone free cropland, he was able to slowly but surely grow and improve. During the twenties, Katherine and the children often spent many months alone on the homestead while Stefan would seek out paying employment with the autumn threshing gangs in Saskatchewan and winter freighting with the Icelanders out of Riverton. A second quarter of land, the 'Hudson's Bay Company' quarter, was purchased in the early thirties, and with help from the boys, it too was largely cleared and put into crop production.


The family eventually grew to include a total of eight children. They were: Nick (born: 1910), Mike (1914), Walter (1916), Ed (1918), Helen (1922), Sabina (1925), Albina (1927), and Andrew (1934). Stefan continued to farm even as Mike, Walter and Ed left the farm to establish businesses in Poplarfield and to work in the bush-camps and mines of northwestern Ontario.

Stefan and Katherine retired from farming in 1948 and with the proceeds of the farm auction, built themselves a retirement home in Poplarfield. During the early 1950's, they sponsored Polish immigrants Stanislaw and Aniela Nawrot and their young son Joe, who took up residence in Winnipeg. The Nawrots were distant relatives of Katherine's. When Stefan and Katherine's home was destroyed by fire in 1958, at the Nawrots' invitation, they moved to Winnipeg and lived in a suite in the Nawrot home. For a time, son Nick lived with his parents in their suite.

Stefan passed away on March 13, 1962 at the age of 78. Katherine continued to live with the Nawrots until the late 1960s when she moved in with her daughter Albina for a year until a room became available in the Holy Ghost Senior Centre. Katherine very much enjoyed her new friends and life at Holy Ghost and hoped to remain there until she reached a hundred. However, Katherine took ill in 1979 and spent her final months at St. Joseph's Personal Care Home in Winnipeg. She passed away at the age of 89, on December 6, 1981 while giving her son Walter a big final hug.

Stefan and Katherine were laid to rest side by side at the Holy Ghost Roman Catholic Cemetery in Winnipeg, Manitoba.









Stefan and Nick pose for a photo beside the family's steel-wheeled John Deere tractor which was purchased, used, about 1937.





Stefan patting down a young colt. Horses were used for light farm work and winter transportation until the early 1950s, and good animals were highly prized. Note the herd of cows in the background.




Nick at the controls of a rubber-wheeled tractor, pulling a binder and cutting down a fine looking crop, sometime during the war years.




Mother snaps another farmyard scene, this time with Andrew on the John Deere, Nick in the feedshed doorway, and one of the farmhorses getting in on the action.







Nicholas Ledohowski

Nick was born on December 20, 1910 in Stubno, Poland, and although he came into the world a normal and healthy baby boy, as an infant he contacted typhoid fever, and was rendered completely deaf. As he had not yet learned to speak before he fell ill, as a child and adult he was also largely unable to speak, despite possessing normal vocal cords. As soon as he was old enough his father Stefan sent him to the Manitoba School for the Deaf in Winnipeg to be educated through sign-language. Nick attended the residential school for approximately eight years, coming home during the summer holidays to help out on the farm and be with the family.


Despite his handicap, Nick was a proud man and always self-sufficient. During the early 1930's, Nick worked for Joe Hudhda, a Fisher Branch area farmer, followed by a job at a hotel in Winnipeg owned by Mr. Menard who had family in Fisher Branch. After a time, Nick found employment with an upholstery manufacturer. He continued with the upholstery business in Winnipeg until the mid-1960s, when he moved to Toronto, finding similar work there. An extremely generous man, Nick often sent gifts to family members.

While living in Toronto, Nick became acquainted with Grace Sunderland, a widow, and in December 1967, in his 57th year, they were married. After Nick and Grace's marriage, Grace's son Albert lived with her and his new step-father, Nick. Albert was welcomed into the Ledohowski clan by his new aunts, uncles and cousins, and he enjoyed visiting his new relatives. Albert himself became a step-father in 1998 when he married, Donna, a divorced mother of two girls. The Sunderland family currently live happily together in Red Deer, Alberta.


Grace passed away in 1977. After, Nick moved to Vernon, British Columbia, where he lived contently until his passing in 1987 at the age of 77.


Mike Ledohowski


Mike left the family farm in his early teens at the height of the Great Depression, and found work in the timber and mining operations of NW Ontario. After several years as a timber cutter, a truck and tractortrain freighter, a saw-mill operator, and a blast captain in a gold mine, in 1938 he took his savings and enrolled in a short-course mechanic's school in Chicago, Illinois. Returning to Poplarfield he built a small sawmill, cut his own lumber, and built the National Garage in the 'New Poplarfield' town site. In 1940 he enlisted in the Canadian Army and served six years with the Canadian 3rd Division Provost Corp in Britain and Europe. Accompanying him home from England in 1946 was Joan Bloxam, and before divorcing in 1949, they had two daughters together, Dian/46 and Gloria/49.

In October, 1951, Mike married a former Poplarfield area friend, Ann Lisowecki-Chekosky, recently widowed. They would share 50 years of marriage and family together, which included two more children for Mike, sons Ed/53 and Wayne/56, and two stepsons by Anne's first marriage, Ken and Ron Chekosky. Mike and Ann operated the National Garage for 20 years, after which they ran a registered grain and timothy grass seed farm for 22 years, and during which they ran the Poplarfield Post Office for 19 years. In 1979, at age 65, Mike obtained his pilot's licence and over the next 11 years logged 1,200 hours of flying time in his Piper Cub. Mike retired from farming in 1984 at the age of 70. Mike's passions were hunting, mechanics and community development. He was instrumental in establishing the Poplarfield Community Centre, the Poplarfield Curling Club, and the Fisher Game & Fish Association, and served for many years on the executive of the Arborg Legion Branch No.161. Ann Ledohowski passed away on May 17, 2003 at the age of 84. Mike continues to live in Poplarfield, where at age 91, he still drives his own car, and continues to be physically and active.



Walter Ledohowski

As a young man Walter worked with father Stefan on the family homestead in the Sharpewood Postal District, and also established a transfer business in nearby Poplarfield, Manitoba. On September 15, 1940 he married Anne Zasitko and they eventually had two daughters and four sons (Jane/41, Ben/42, Leo/44, Carol/46, Chris/57 & Ron/63). Walter and Anne operated the Poplarfield Transfer for seven years during which time Walter also continued to assist his father on the farm. In 1947, Walter purchased the Coronation Hotel in Poplarfield and operated it until 1954 when he decided to go into farming full time. Walter was among the first to grow registered grain for seed, and was responsible for introducing Timothy grass seed production to the Interlake region.

Although his first love was the land, he chose to go back into the hotel business and, in 1960, purchased the Broadview Hotel in Saskatchewan, followed by the Yorkton Hotel in 1964. Over time, his four sons would join him and eventually become major hoteliers in Western Canada. After purchases of a hotel and a pair of motels in Winnipeg and 20 years in Saskatchewan, Walter and Anne moved back to Manitoba in 1979 and made their permanent home in Winnipeg.

Walter was an avid outdoorsman who enjoyed fishing, hunting, camping, and good company. Walter Ledohowski passed away at the age of 70 on May 21, 1987 and was laid to rest at Chapel Lawn, in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Anne remained near her children in Winnipeg, and passed away on October 23, 2005.







Ed Ledohowski

At age 14, Ed decided it was time to leave home. He rode the rails to northwestern Ontario and found work in the mines and bush camps. He would come home for regular visits, before returning to NW Ontario, where he was in 1939 as a 21 year old, when WWII broke out. He immediately made his way to Camp Petawawa, Ontario where he enlisted into the service. He was assigned to the Provost Corps, as a military police officer but his poor eyesight kept him on the home front. Stationed in Vancouver, he frequently escorted prisoners of war to the camps, convoy and transport duties, etc. On one fateful day, Ed found himself in an altercation, apparently with a group of American soldiers, and received a severe beating, resulting in permanent brain damage. A good portion of his life after that was spent in various hospitals.

During the late 1960s, Ed was released into the custody of his brother Walter's son, Ben. After that, Ed lived for a number of years with brother Walter in Yorkton, Saskatchewan, and also worked for Ben at a motel in Winnipeg, Manitoba, His latter years were spent at Deer Lodge Veteran's Hospital in Winnipeg. During these years his sister Albina Buchko acted as legal guardian.

Ed passed away at the age of 70 of cancer in May of 1989 and was laid to rest with military honours by a Canadian Legion Colour Party. Helen Ledohowski

Born June 4, 1922 on the family farm, Helen was the first girl in the family after four boys. Like her brothers and sisters, Helen attended Sharpewood School before moving to Winnipeg. During war years of the early 1940s she worked in Winnipeg on airplanes used for pilot training. In 1945 Helen moved to Toronto. She found work with the Toronto Transit Commission and then found employment at Radio Valve, doing production testing of radio tubes. Invited several times by the 'boy next door' for a date, she finally relented and continued dating Raymond Leslie Chidley for about two years before they married on October 19, 1956. Ray and Helen honeymooned in New York City and while out for dinner, got to meet Jimmy Dorsey of the Dorsey Brothers band, one of the top big bands of their day, and received a personally autographed picture which the family still treasures.

Helen and Ray raised a family of two sons and a daughter, Paul (1958), David (1961), and Sandra (1963). The family lived in Scarborough, Ontario, where Ray was employed as Traffic Manager for Sifto Salt. They enjoyed time at the family cottage in Bala (Muskoka), Ontario.

Helen sketched and painted most of her life. As a member of the Scarborough Art Guild she enjoyed many friendships, art shows, and especially meeting the special guest artists such as Tom Chatfield, Andy Donato and Robert Bateman. Not only did paintings of these artists hang in the family home, but dozens of Helen's own paintings did as well. Although often asked to sell them, she hated to part with any of them. Helen passed away on October 15, 2001 at the age of 79. Services were held October 19, in Scarborough, Ontario, on what would have been her 45th wedding anniversary.







Sabina Ledohowski

Sabina was born on the family farm on May 2,1925. Like her siblings, she attended Sharpewood School as a child. In 1939, at the beginning of World War II, she had to quit school in order to help out on the farm, with her older brothers now either in the Army or having left home. In 1943, Sabina herself left home, and obtained employment in Winnipeg, at the C.A.T.P. No.5 Air Observer School, which trained Air Force navigators and bombardiers. At war's end in 1945, she moved on to Toronto, Ontario and, after taking a Business Course, found employment with an electronics firm, where she worked for several years. About this time she met and later, in 1953, married Thomas Feeley of Toronto. Together they soon started up a house building company, with Sabina handling the bookkeeping, and looking to the needs of a growing family.

Sabina and Tom raised a family of four: Gordon (1954, accountant); Robert ('55, dentist); Kathryn ('58, fashion designer); and Brian ('63), who took over the family business after Tom Feeley's passing in 1995. After retirement, Sabina embarked upon an active lifestyle which included collecting art and antiques, and art classes which led to Art Group workshop trips to various exotic locations in Canada, the USA, Britain, continental Europe, Hong Kong, and Indonesia.

In 2000, Sabina travelled with nephew Ben Ledohowski, his wife Janet and daughter Lara, on a memorable trip of several weeks' length to Argentina for the family's first meeting with relatives from mother Catherine's side of the family. Currently, while still maintaining a home in Toronto, summer months are more often spent at the family cottage on Lake Simcoe with family and friends, and enjoying golf and many activities with the grandchildren - and time during the late autumn at her daughter's condo in Siesta Key, Florida.





Albina (Al as she is often called) was the last to leave the family farm in Sharpewood. During the summer of 1948 she left to work at her brother Walter's hotel in Poplarfield. That fall, she met Victor Buchko at a dance in Fisher Branch. Victor returned from Toronto the following spring, rekindled the relationship, proposed marriage and they were wed on July 15, 1950. They farmed in the Fisher Branch area until 1961 when they moved with their 3 daughters to Churchill, Manitoba to work at brother-in-law, Mike Chernichan's, hotel.

In 1964 they returned to Fisher Branch to take over the Buchko farm. Al held part-time jobs showing her creative ability making arrangements at the floral shop and displayed caring and compassion for her home-care clients. Farming was tough and during the fall of 1973, they managed the Stony Mountain Hotel, then returned in the spring to put in the crops. They sold the farm and moved to Winnipeg in 1979. Al acquired a housekeeping position at St. Benedicts until retiring in 1984. She also helped to look after her mother and brother Ed, till their passing. She enjoyed camping with the family at Watchhorn Beach and other campgrounds in Manitoba, Minnesota and North Dakota. Hunting and fishing were annual events with Victor. Curling and snowmobiling were great pastimes and she also took up cross-country sking. Albina travelled to many locations, accompanying her sister Helen to Florida and Calgary, and with Victor to Texas, Mexico, Grand Cayman, Vancouver and Toronto.

Andrew Ledohowski

Andrew Ledohowski was born on the family farm in Sharpewood on February 4, 1934. He attended several local schools and at age 15, after completing grade 9, he began his long working career in the mechanical world, with a job at his brother Mike's National Garage in New Poplarfield.

He then moved up to working at a hydro dam construction site in Pine Falls, Manitoba, which was followed by a job driving a dumpster, building a railway grade in Northern Manitoba. The spring of 1954 found Andy working for B.C. Forest Products on Vancouver Island. The job involved attaching cables to logs being dragged across the mountain sides to loading docks. Two hours into his second job site a close friend was killed, followed by a close call on his own life. Deciding a change of career was in order, he then found work on a series of road construction projects across central Alberta, as a cat & scrapper operator. This was followed by a year at Uranium City, Saskatchewan with a diamond drill crew doing surface exploration. Next was a job as a general mechanic at a series of Distant Early Warning (DEW) Line radar sites in the far Arctic, with the final job site being on the coast of Baffin Island. Returning to Edmonton in 1961, Andy found work as a diesel mechanic with Caterpillar Inc. and, after gaining certification in 1961, became the company Field Mechanic, doing on-thejob-site repairs at locations across Northern Alberta. He then finally settled into a long career in the pipeline industry, first as a heavy duty mechanic during the laying of the TransCanada Pipeline across Western Canada to Ontario, and into the United States. He continued the same type of oil pipeline work for the rest of his working life, which included a year-long job in the deserts of Saudi Arabia. Andy finally retired from working the oil patch in 1993.


Andrew first met Joyce Larson while living in Edmonton in 1954. After a two-year courtship, they married on November 30, 1956. 



John Ledochowski

John (Ivan) Ledochowski was born in Przemysl, Eastern Poland to Gregory and Anna Ledochowski in August of 1887. He was their second child, brother Stefan having been born three years earlier. Four more sibilings, three brothers and a sister, would follow in the coming years.

In 1903, John was a young man of 16 when his whole family immigrated to Canada, except for brother Stefan who was serving in the Austrian Army and would follow later. John lived with his parents and siblings on the family homestead in what would eventually become known as the Hamrlik Postal District, but it was a number of years before a district post office was established. The family was the earliest to settle in the district, together with the Hamrlik family, and it was several years before other settlers began arriving in the area.

The early years were very difficult and as the 'oldest' of the children, John worked extra hard to help the family get a solid foothold in what was then nothing but an isolated wilderness, comprised of 'bush, swamp and stones'.


After four years, in January 1907, John walked 40 miles to the Dominion Land Office in Stonewall and submitted a claim for a homestead of his own, choosing quarter section NE 2-22-1 WPM, near his father's homestead. He then commenced to build a house, labouring long and hard to clear and break the land, initially, using nothing but an axe, pick, and shovel. His application for Patent or Title, later indicated that he had taken up residence in the house in March of 1908.

In 1909, John Ledochowski married Annie Pawnick. They went on to raise a family of eight - three sons and five daughters: Katie (1910), Mike (1912), Pearl (1914), Mary (1915), Peter (1918), Roy (1920), Nellie (1927), and Helen (1931).

Like most men in the area, for a number of years John would work for four to six weeks each year on the fall harvest gangs in Southern Manitoba and Saskatchewan to earn cash money.

In 1919, after 12 years of occupancy, John applied for patent and title to the homestead. After visiting the farm, the Homestead Inspector recorded that John had managed to put only 16 acres under cultivation during this time, but in his recommendation to grant patent, described the property as being "bush and stoney land where one acre of breaking is equivilent to 11 acres prairie land". The inspection report also noted that John's other assets at the time included a wife, 5 children, 17 cattle, 5 horses, 4 hogs, a log home 40'x28' in size, a log barn 40'x24', a 22'x12' granary, a well, 100 acres of timber land, 30 acres of hayland and 10 acres of swamp land.

John and Annie continued to farm on the family homestead until 1957 when they sold the farm and retired to the nearby community of Arborg. John Ledochowski passed away in 1963 at the age of 76. Annie lived to be 85, passing away in 1977. John and Annie are buried side by side at the All Saints Cemetery in Winnipeg.













Couple Celebrates Golden Wedding






Kay Ledochowski



Pearl passed away on June 16, 2005 at the age of 89 and was laid to rest in the All Saints Cemetery in Winnipeg.









After retiring Roy and Margaret enjoyed traveling with their motor home and frequent fishing trips.






Nellie Ledochowski was born on the family farm in the Hamrlik District on April 3, 1927. As a child she attended nearby Leeland School.







Chapter Four

Fred Ledochowski

Fred, the third oldest of Gregory and Anne Ledochowski's six children, was born on February 20th, 1890 in southeastern Poland. Fred was 13 when the family immigrated to Canada in 1903, and after arriving, lived and worked on his parents' homestead in the Hamrlik District until he reached the age of 19, in 1909, and filed for a homestead of his own. Located at SE 35-21-1W, it was only a mile from his parents' farm.

In 1911, Fred met and soon married Anne Sawka who had come to Canada with her parents and sisters the year before from the village of Horycki, District of Drohobych, in Ukraine. After a house had been built, Fred and Anna moved onto their homestead. Together they brought 16 children into the world, of which 13 survived to adulthood. There were: John (born 1913), Harry (1914), Mike (1915), Mary (1916), Steve (1918), Kay (1919), Alex (1922), Joe (1925), Kost (1926), Paul (1930), George (1932), Dan (1933) and Gloria (1939). In addition, three other children died in infancy. Mary in 1912 after burning herself on an open fire, and twins Nellie & Annie in 1936 after Anna, who was eight months pregnant, was kicked in the stomach by a cow while milking it.


During the difficult early years, Fred together with some of his brothers, often took jobs on the railroad during the summers months, and went to Saskatchewan to work on the harvesting gangs in the autumn, leaving the wives to care for the children and the farm animals. During the winter at home, they cut cordwood and trapped for food and fur for sale. In 1919 Fred and his brother John purchased a used steam tractor and started a sawmill business providing people

in the district with lumber. While away tending to the mill operation, Anna undertook all the chores on the farm, with the help of the older children. In later years, the family farm grew in size, as Fred acquired two more nearby quarter-sections of land for pasture, crops and hay. In 1949, Fred bought the Co-op General Store in Chatfield, the operation of which was assigned to son, George, at the time only 17. After overseeing the business for a short time, the store was then sold to George.

Fred was self-educated and a master of all trades in the agricultural field. With the help of his wife, Anna, he was a builder, butcher, gardener, groomsman, hunter, mechanic, shearer of sheep, trapper, and veterinarian - healing farm animals and neutering the male farm animals - growing a variety of field crops, and putting up hay for feeding the farm animals in the winter.

In his senior years, Fred did chores around the farm, never truly retiring until he no longer had the strength and was too weak to work. In 1971, Fred and Anna celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary with all of their 13 children present.

Fred passed away on June 4, 1973 at the age of 83 and was laid to rest in the Chatfield Community Cemetery. Anne passed away on March 21, 1984 at the age of 92 years and was buried next to her husband. The original farmhouse still exists in 2003 and for many years has been the home of Dan Leduchowski, who is the last remaining family member in Canada making a living as a farmer.















John Leduchowski

John was born in 1913 and was the oldest son of Fred and Anne. He completed grade 6 at Wheat Hill School. After helping on the farm, he went to Saskatchewan to help with harvesting in the early 1930s. While at home, John, with the 300 Savage rifle, proved to be a very successful hunter. He provided the family with much of the food. John also trapped in the Interlake area. He also pitched for the Wheat Hill baseball team and had a very good fastball.

Later, John went to Ontario peeling pulp and working in a mine. In 1942 he bought a 2-ton truck so he could haul gravel and pulpwood. 1944 saw John move to Port Arthur where he cut pulpwood and bought a 3-ton truck. After hauling pulpwood he went back to cutting wood, and did some prospecting in the Beardmore area. John then worked for Abitibi Price Company for 15 years. During his time in Port Arthur John lived in a boarding house in the city. John passed away at the age of 76 in 1989 and is buried with family members in the Chatfield Cemetery.

Harry Leduchowski

Harry, the second son of Fred and Anne, was born on the family farm on March 1, 1914. He attended the local school, but only formally finished grade 4. Harry educated himself over the years. He worked on the family farm helping his mother and father with farm chores. In the 1930's, he left the family farm, jumped the train boxcars and travelled to Ontario. After working at bush camps, he eventually travelled to Timmins. There, he worked in the gold mines for a few years, eventually travelling to Toronto. He worked as a pipe fitter for many years at Grinnells and during the last ten years, did maintenance (repairing the machinery that made the pipes for gas lines).

Harry married Hattie Swedlo (daughter of Mike and Mary Swedlo of Poplarfield, Manitoba) in Toronto, Ontario, on March, 1943. They had 4 daughters, Agnes (1944), Patricia (1945), Linda (1947) and Sharon (1949). Harry had many hobbies which included hunting, fishing, camping and boating. He once built his own boat from blueprints. Harry loved to take his daughters camping and fishing with him to the North Georgian Bay area. He was a family man who enjoyed travelling to Manitoba to visit his family on a regular basis. Harry died from lung cancer at 79 years of age, June, 1993. He is buried in North Toronto. His wife Hattie died in 2002 and is buried beside Harry.










Mike Leduchowski

Mike was born in 1915. After completing grade five at Wheathill School he helped on the farm. Mike hauled cream for the Chatfield Creamery, earning 25 cents a can. In the 1930s, Mike and his friends were jumping boxcars to get to Ontario. Mike then worked in a mine in Ontario and then cut wood.

For many years after, Mike trucked pulpwood. In the late 1960s Mike was in a serious accident, when a truck approaching his truck lost its logs. Mike injured his back and lived in Dryden for many years. In 1970, Mike moved back to Teulon where he raised trout in his backyard pond. While in Teulon, Mike enjoyed spending occasional afternoons at the racetrack in Winnipeg. He also enjoyed watching his nephews and nieces play baseball and hockey. Mike was always on hand to give George advice about his construction company and about baseball. Mike was also known to ponder important decisions over a 'micky', with the decision made upon the finishing of the bottle.

Mike was a generous and kind person, who always enjoyed the family's visits and companionship and hunting with his brothers. For three years Mike lived in Co-op housing in Teulon. Mike passed away peacefully in 1996 and is buried at the Chatfield Cemetery.





Mary Leduchowski

Mary Leduchowski was born on August 28, 1916 in the family farm house. She attended nearby Wheathill School, but as a young girl quit school to help out full time at home, given her mother's rapidly growing family and few sisters in the family to help with the many household, garden and farmyard chores. During her later teens, Mary was courted by Mike Martyniuk, whose family lived and farmed in the district. After working for a time in Winnipeg as a housemaid, Mary accepted Mike's proposal of marriage and on September 18, 1937 in St. John's Greek Orthodox Church in Winnipeg, they were married. The wedding reception was held a week later back home on the farm in Hamrlik. After the reception Mike and Mary left for Thunder Bay, Ontario taking with them but one suitcase and 30 dollars cash to start a life together.

After various short-term labouring jobs, Mike and Mary rented and operated a rooming and boarding house for several years. 1944 was spent at a bush camp where Mike ran the camp and Mary was the cook for about 30 men, after which they bought a house in Jumbo Gardens outside the city, where they lived for 13 years and where their two daughters, Gladys and Sharon spent their early childhood. Gladys was born on September 15, 1940 and Sharon on February 27, 1946. In May of 1956 the family moved into a new home in Port Arthur, where Mike and Mary lived happily for an additional 36 years. Mike was employed in the lumber trade, while Mary managed the house and the large gardens, which she and Mike developed over the years.

In 1992 Mary and Mike moved back to Manitoba to take up residence in a seniors apartment residence, to be close to their children and their families, both of whom lived in Winnipeg. Mike passed away on January 5, 1995. Mary remained in the apartment until 2002 when she moved in with daughter Sharon. Mary passed away in August 2003 and was laid to rest next to her husband at Glen Eden Gardens in Winnipeg.


Steve Leduchowski

Steve was born on June 12, 1918. He attended Wheathill School and completed grade 6. He was the biggest in the family, as an adult was six foot two inches, 250 pounds. During the war years, Steve attempted to volunteer for the Services but was not accepted due to his large size. He remained at home and worked on the family farm until 1945 when he flew out to Red Lake, Ontario and obtained work in the mines.

He later came to Geraldton and was hired by Kimberly Clark Above: Steve Leduchowski partner Luba Skok. to haul wood to the mill with his truck. Steve and Walter Keemle, friends from Red lake, were the company's top wood haulers. At Geraldton he met Luba Skok, and together they had three children, Elsie (1954); Brian (1957) and Jim (1958). Later, Steve started his own contracting business, and with hard work the business expanded steadily. He was never scared to take a risk and often bought equipment not knowing if it would even work. Steve enjoyed hunting and fishing. He also enjoyed watching baseball and hockey, and visiting with his grandchildren. He was an excellent gardener, whatever he planted it was sure to flourish. In 1998, he purchased property on Kenogamisis Lake near Geraldton for sand, gravel and a residence site.





Kay Leduchowski

Kay Leduchowski was born on August 12, 1919 on the family homestead. She was the sixth of 13 children, and like all her siblings attended nearby Wheat Hill School. At age 20, she left the family farm to join her sister Mary Martyniuk in Port Arthur, now called Thunder Bay. Her first employment was as a chamber maid at the Avenue Hotel. In 1942, she took employment at the local aircraft plant called "Can-Car", beginning work as a aircraft assembly line riveter, building Hawker Hurricane fighter planes for Britain, before moving on to the building of the Curtiss Hell Diver bombers for the USA Navy. It was here in the Can-Car plant that she met her future husband John Petrick. They married, after a courtship of two years, on September 23, 1944. They recently celebrated 58 years of marriage.

In 1972 Kay accepted a caretaker's position at Confederation College in Thunder Bay. Kay and John built their own home in 1954, and a cottage on Hicks Lake, 40 miles from home, in 1972. They were blessed with two sons, Clayton and Gary. Both were lost tragically, Clayton at age 44 in 1992 and Gary at age 25 in 1975. Kay was an active member of Trinity Lutheran Church and her strong faith in her creator led her family to also take a leadership role in the church. In her social activities she volunteered for years delivering "Meals on Wheels" to shut-in seniors and the handicapped, and was also active in the Red Cross where, with her husband John, both donated over 50 pints of blood. John retired in 1986 after 46 years as a Charge Hand and Supervisor.





Alex Leduchowski

Alex Leduchowski was born on October 15, 1922. He attended Wheathill School and also went to Teulon where he took Grade XI. In school, Alex was known for his unusual activities and leadership, which often made things interesting for the teachers. At 18, Alex left the farm to pursue work in the bush camps in Northwestern Ontario. After a number of years in the camps, Alex ventured into his own logging and trucking company in Dryden and Thunder Bay. Alex was a very strong man, one time lifting a 100 pound sack of flour ten times using only his right arm. When provoked, people knew there was going to be trouble when Alex would first adjust his glasses, then take them off, pull his belt up tight and step forward to confront the trouble-makers. He was also known for his amazing fastball which his brothers had difficulty in catching. He was also a very good boxer, being an avid believer in shadow boxing and the use of short six-inch jabs. Alex also did some prospecting in the Beardmore and Dryden areas.

Alex left norhwestern Ontario in the 1970s to join h is brother Paul in the hotel business in Saskatchewan, working from 1970 to 1975 at the Queen's Hotel in Moosomin, and from 1975 to 1979 at the York Hotel in Swift Current. In 1979, Alex retired from the hotel business and returned to live on the family homestead. Alex was an avid prosector, trapper and hunter, and immensely enjoyed these pursuits. He was known for storytelling whenever he got together with family. Alex always made time to attend local baseball games and hockey games, and loved to watch his nephews and nieces play sports. On October 18, 1998, Alex passed away after a short battle with cancer. He was laid to rest near his parents and brothers in the Chatfield Community Cemetery.








Joe Leduchowski

Joe was born in 1925. He attended Wheathill School and completed grade 8. After school, Joe worked on the family farm for two years. During the early 1940's Joe worked for 3 ½ years at Canada Car in Fort William, Ontario where he helped build airplanes for the war effort. Joe then worked one year in Odden, Ontario, cutting pulpwood. In 1948 he married Helen Sumka of the Sky Lake District, near Chatfield. Shortly after, he worked at building the Pine Portage hydroelectric power dam near Nipigon, Ontario. In 1949, Joe returned to Chatfield where he bought the Chatfield Transfer. He operated the transfer for 27 years, and also farmed in the Sky Lake District for many of those years.

While living in Chatfield, Joe was President of the Chatfield Sports Club for eight years. From 1945-1968 Joe was active as a player and manager for the Chatfield baseball team. Joe's actions usually spoke louder than his words, as the following example will testify. Joe believes in fair play, and one time during a game at Oak Point, an umpire (who happened to be the father of one of the opposition players) would not call any strikes. Joe, catching at the time, questioned him. The umpire promptly ejected Joe from the game. Joe responded by saying: "If I'm out of the game, then so are you", and proceeded to pick the umpire up, lift him over his head, and throw him over a five foot fence out of the baseball diamond. Hunting, fishing, and trapping have always been favorite pastimes, which Joe continues to enjoy. Joe sold the transfer business in 1976 and worked at the York Hotel in Swift Current, Saskatchewan for two years. The farms in Sky Lake were sold and Joe then worked construction for several years. In 1986, he and Helen purchased the Towers Hotel in Dauphin, Manitoba, which they continue to operate. In 1996 Joe and Helen bought a home in Dauphin. Joe was inducted into the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame in 2003 as a member of the 1952-59 Chatfield Cardinals.







Kost Leduchowski

Kost was born in 1926. He attended Wheathill School and completed grade 8. After grade 8 he helped on the farm for four years. Kost worked in the Lake St. George area cutting and hauling pulpwood. In 1945 Kost moved to Port Arthur cutting wood. 1949 saw Kost move to Toronto where he worked at carpentry and construction.


From 1955 to 1962, Kost worked in Geraldton, Ontario and then Dryden, cutting in the bush. Kost was a very powerful man, both in the bush and in everyday life. In one feat of strength, after finding himself outside a 'bootlegger's' house during a police raid in Geraldton, Ontario, Kost was handcuffed to the police car. After the Police left to enter the house. Kost twisted the car door off its hinges and walked off to town, with the door in hand. His friend, Nick Ozubko, cut the cuffs off. The Police had to drive the town's only cruiser without a door, for a week before a new one could be delivered.

1962 saw Kost in Saskatchewan at the Esterhazy Hotel and also the potash mines. From 1963 to 1988 Kost cut pulpwood (5 to 6 cords a day) in the Pine Falls area of Manitoba. In 1988 Kost retired and moved back to the family homestead to live with brother Dan. As an observer, Kost was a man of few words, but when he spoke everyone always listened.








Paul Leduchowski

Paul left the farm in 1948, and like most of his siblings, initially obtained work in the lumber camps of northwestern Ontario. He also found work with the CPR in Toronto, Canada Packers in Winnipeg, and one year working in his cousin Walter's Coronation Hotel in Poplarfield before settling in a position as a logger with the pulp and paper mill in Dryden, Ontario, where he was employed until 1960.

On October 8, 1955 Paul married Myrtle Zolkewich of Poplarfield. Paul and Myrtle raised four children, Patrick, born 1957; Kathryn born 1959; Glen born 1962; and Louise born in 1968.

In 1960 Paul & Myrtle ventured into the hotel business, with cousin Walter Ledohowski, with the Broadview Hotel, in Broadview Saskatchewan. In 1962 they purchased the Central Hotel in Esterhazy. In 1970 Paul took over the Queens Hotel in Moosomin, which brother Alex helped to operate. Five years later Paul and Alex moved to Swift Current where they purchased and ran the York Hotel. During the 1980s they owned the Bridge House Hotel in Moose Jaw, the Holiday Inn (Seven Oaks), and Plains Hotel in Regina.

Paul retired in 1990 and since then he and Myrtle have enjoyed their retirement, travelling, visiting with family, and owning a hobby farm not far from the old family homestead near Poplarfield, Manitoba. In 2003 Paul was inducted into the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame as a member of the 1952-59 Chatfield Cardinals.











George Ledochowski


After completing his schooling at Wheathill School, George began his high-school education in Inwood. After his father Fred purchased the bankrupt Chatfield Co-op Store, George was called home to assist in its re-opening and operation under the family name. Before long, he arranged to purchase the store from his father and in 1949 became a full time store keeper.

In 1954 he married his sweetheart, Laura Ferris who hailed from the Suffern District west of Chatfield. They had four children, Roger, Roxane, Ross, and Rodney. George and Laura operated the Ledochowski Store in Chatfield until 1970 when they had the buildings moved to property along PTH #7 in Teulon. The new business began as a roadside restaurant, which thrived and later expanded to include a lounge and motel units. The 'G & L' was sold in 1986 whereafter George increased his time spent at his main sideline business of custom roadbuilding and land clearing on farms throughout the Interlake region.

In 2003, at the age of 71 George was still working at his earth-moving business. Throughout the years he continued his involvement and passion for first love, baseball, managing and coaching the Teulon Cardinals of the Winnipeg Senior Baseball League for many years. 
Dan was born in 1933 and completed grade 8 at Wheat Hill School. Dan then worked on the family farm for the next eight years. From there, Dan moved to Winnipeg where he poured basements for the next two years. For the next eight years, Dan hauled gravel for Frasers. The years 1969 to 1972 saw Dan move back to Chatfield and work for the Department of Highways in Poplarfield. From Highways, Dan then took over the cattle farm.

In his younger years, Dan was active in hunting, trapping and baseball. He played outfield for most of his baseball career but did pitch a little, once throwing a one hitter at a baseball tournament in Hodgson, Manitoba. He was noted to always get on base even if he had to use his elbows. In 2003 Dan was inducted into the Manitoba Baseball Hall of Fame as a member of the 1952-59 Chatfield Cardinals. Dan has been an active member of the Chatfield Community Club. He has collected admission to annual baseball tournaments for the Club for more than 50 years. It should be noted that Dan was last Leduchowski to make a living as a farmer. He continued to reside in the original family farmhouse built by his father raising cattle until shortly before he passed away of cancer on September 17, 2006.



Gloria Ledochowski

Gloria Ledochowski was born on June 25, 1939 in the family farmhouse. After completing eight grades in seven years at Wheat Hill School, Gloria left at age 14 to attend Spruce View School in Chatfield, where she completed grades nine and ten. Grades 11 and 12 were completed at Daniel McIntye and Gordon Bell High Schools in Winnipeg. During these later studies, she worked part-time as a waitress, and as a live-in nanny for her board and room. From 1955 to 1958 she was a member of the Canadian Air Force Reserves and trained with the Intelligence Specialist Unit.

In 1958 she earned her teacher's certificate at the Manitoba Teacher's College and following graduation taught in three rural Manitoba Schools, Hoey East (Libau), Lake Francis, and Chatfield. She then moved to Manhattan, New York for a year of study at Grace Downs School. After returning, she taught grades 6, 7, & 8 at the St. John Catholic School in Red Lake, Ontario for two years, and was also acting-principal and school secretary. She then taught at the Convent of the Sacred Heart (private girls' school) in Charleswood, Manitoba, and at Atikokan and Red Rock Ontario, each for one year. From September 1967 to June of 1996, Gloria obtained a position with the Wellington County Roman Catholic Separate School Board in Guelph where she was employed for almost 30 years.

In 1970 while teaching full-time, Gloria enrolled in part-time studies at Wilfred Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario and graduated in 1977 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree with a major in (child) Psychology and a minor in Geography. Gloria participated in three Educator Exchange Programs: to Winnipeg, Manitoba in 1983-84; Griffith, New South Wales, Australia in 1987; and to Augusta, Western Australia in 1995. Since retiring in 1996, Gloria has been active as a volunteer with the Victorian Order of Nurses, and currently resides in Guelph, Ontario.






Peter Ledochowski

Peter Ledohowski was nine years old in 1903, when he accompanied his father and mother, Gregory and Anna Ledochowski, and four of his five siblings, and embarked on the S.S. Assyria, departing Hamburg, Germany for Canada, with high hopes for a new and better life as pioneers in the wilderness of Manitoba's Interlake region. Older brother Stefan joined the family in 1910.

Like his brothers, Peter took a homestead of his own close to his parents' farm as soon as he was old enough to qualify. His claim was registered on March 7, 1913.

Peter Ledochowski married Catherine Panella about 1917 and together they raised a family of five, two sons and three daughters; Rose Marie (born 1918), Annie (1920), William (1922), Victoria (1934) and James (1944). Two other children died as infants, Alex & Alicia. Peter sold the farm in the late 1940s and purchased a home in Stonewall, Manitoba. The two youngest children, Vicky and Jim, accompanied their parents to Stonewall. Rose Marie and Annie both moved to the Detroit area, and Bill settled in Winnipeg. While living in Stonewall, Peter worked as a mechanic at Stonewall Motors and Ford Dealership until he retired.

Catherine passed away on August 9, 1950 and was laid to rest in the Stonewall Community Cemetery. During the mid-fifties Peter remarried, to Mary Dudtka, a recent widow from the Stonewall area. Peter remained in Stonewall until he passed away at the age of 72 in 1968. Peter Ledochowski was laid to rest alongside Catherine in Stonewall, Manitoba.










Rose Marie Leduchowski

Rose Marie married Daniel Dedeluk in 1934 at the age of 16 and soon after Rose Marie and Dan moved to Detroit, Michigan. They had two children together: Robert Daniel (born 1937), and Judith Ann (born 1940).

She and Dan later divorced, and in 1948 she married Gerald Sammons and moved to Dearborn, Michigan. In 1962 Rose Marie again remarried to Floyd Slomon, and they moved to Lincoln Park, Michigan. Only one year later, Floyd tragically passed away. Wanting to keep Floyd's three children, Susan, Charlene, and Charles together as a family unit, she raised them until they all graduated from High School.

Rose Marie had five grandchildren, Robert, Allen, Todd, Shelley and Charisse. If alive today she would have had eight greatgrandchildren: Matthew, Jason, Shawn, Brittney, Michael, Nicole, Jessica and Meagan.

Rose Marie worked for Town-Robinson Fastener Company in Detroit, Michigan for 35 years, finally retiring in February 1980. Looking forward to her retirement, she tragically passed away only three months later on May 17, 1980 at the age of 62 years. She was dearly loved by all in her extended family, and would have been extremely proud of her grandchildren and great-grandchildren.











The Wager.

Rather than leaving this page blank, I'll instead use the space to recount the story I once heard of an outstanding feat of strength peformed by 'Great' Uncle Mike Ledochowski. It seems one cold winter evening during the midst of The Great Depression Mike was at John Werbenuk's store in the original 'old' Poplarfield townsite conducting business, along with a group of other customers. Debates and wagers of various sorts were popular 'stove-side' activities. The topic of feats of strength came up, as it often did, and after some discussion, Mr. Werbenuk wagered that Mike (who was well known for his strength), could not carry five one-hundred pound sacks of flour at one time, down the the length of the large store, out the front door, down the stairs and place them into his sled without dropping anything or falling. Mike agreed to the wager, and one by one the heavy sacks were placed on Mike's shoulders and under his arms. With everybody following and cheering him on, he proceeded to exit the store with his prize and load it into his sled, without once faltering. Five hundred pounds of flour during the 'Dirty Thirties', was like winning a lottery and made for lots of bread and other baking in the Ledochowski household that winter, as well as great story telling. I inquired, but nobody seemed to recall, what Uncle Mike put up on his side of the wager. Not that it matters much if you're the winner of the wager.

Michael Ledochowski

Mike was five years old when the family came to Canada on the immigrant steamer S.S. Assyria in 1903, with Dad, Mom and four of his five siblings. The trip and the move to Canada must have been a wonderous adventure for a lad his age.

As did his older brothers, he lived and helped out on the family homestead, and when he was old enough, made his own claim nearby. He likely did not attend school as it was a number of years later that the local school districts were formed.


Mike's homestead was the NE quarter of section 35 township 21 Range 1 West, in the Hamrlik Postal District. It was registered on June 22, 1912. His father had the quarter immediately to the north, brother Peter the one to the west and brother Fred to the south. Mike lived on his homestead as a bachelor for seven years, constructing buildings, clearing land, planting crops and raising a few lifestock as best he could in those early pioneer days. In 1919 he married Elsie Chomica, whose parents had homesteaded in the district. Together they eventually raised a family of six: Nick (born 1920), Sid (1921), Tom (1922), Nellie (1923), Annie (1926) and Helen (1927).

The early pioneer years were difficult for everyone in the district. There was little paying employment to be found anywhere. There were no roads. Even most road allowances weren't cleared for years. It was eight and a half miles to the railway town of Chatfield, and six miles to Poplarfield, mostly through swamps and heavy bush. School for the children was two and a half miles cross country each way.

Elsie was said to be proficient at snaring and skinning rabbits and digging seneca root to sell at the town stores. Sometimes large distances were walked to locate the best high, dry ridges where the seneca root grew best.

Mike, Elsie and the children took part in a number of community organizations, such as the Sporting Club, Women's Institute, and later the Old Timer's CLub, and often volunteered to work at community functions. After more than 25 years of making a living from the land, in 1946 Mike moved the family to Arnes, Manitoba. Six years later, they moved to Winnipeg.

Mike Ledochowski passed away at the age of 62 in 1958. Elsie outlived all the Ledochowski's. She passed away in her one hundred and first year on July 14, 2004.







Sidney Leduchowski

After leaving the family farm during the depths of the Great Depression and 'jumping railroad cars' for a time, Sid enlisted to serve the Allied cause during World War II. He was assigned to service as Stoker 1st Class on the tug 'Helena' with the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Service on the Canadian east coast. After the Allied victory in 1945, he returned to the Interlake and before long established himself with a service station and farm equipment dealership in the hamlet of Finns, Manitoba. He married Helen Genoway of Rama, Saskatchewan on November 19, 1951. Together Sid and Helen had four children, all daughters: Gailbreth (1952), Sydnee (1954), Bonita (1956) and Odelia (1959).

In 1958 the family moved the business from Finns to nearby Riverton where Sid continued to service and sell Massey Ferguson farm machinery. His hard work was rewarded by winning several farm equipment sales awards, which included trips to Rio de Janeiro and Mexico. During his years at Riverton. Sid most enjoyed reading the newspaper funnies to his girls, hunting and fishing, and old cars. He also was an active curler and proudly provided his team with matching curling sweaters sporting the Massy Ferguson colours and logo. A gifted mechanic he loved to fix up old cars and put them into good running condition. He also very much enjoyed a good hockey game. Sid and Helen retired to Kelowna, British Columbia in 1975.



Nellie was born on the family farm on May 9, 1923 and as a child attended Wheathill School together with a large number of her cousins.





Currently, in 2003, Annie and John live in their home on Polson Avenue in Winnipeg, Manitoba where they continue to live an active life.




Katherine (Ledochowski) Kochan

Katherine was born March 4, 1898. Like her older siblings she came with her parents Gregory and Anna to Canada in 1903. She was four years old at the time of the journey. Katherine grew up on her parents' homestead, and helped as much as she could during the early, difficult, pioneer years. At the tender age of 16 she married Michael Kochan, the son of a nearby homesteader.

Mike and Katherine were able to obtain a homestead in the Hamrlik Postal District not far from the rest of the Ledochowski family, on SW quarter of section 15 Township 22 Range 1 West of the principal meridian. Here they made a life for themselves as farmers and raised a family of six: Harry (1917), Mary (1920), Nick (1924), Mike (1927), Peter (1930) and Olga (1939).

Mike and Katherine were active members of the Hamrlik District Church, St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Catholic Church, being among the founding members of the parish. In 1953, after 40 years of farm life, they purchased a house at 465 Logan Avenue in Winnipeg and moved to the city. They celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary in 1963 with many friends, family and former neighbours.

Katherine passed away at the age of 67 on January 9, 1965 and was laid to rest in the Hamrlik Community Cemetery. Mike lived to his 83rd year and passed away on October 17, 1968. He too was laid to rest in the Hamrlik Community Cemetery, near his wife and other family members.





Nick Kochan

Nick was born on February 24, 1924, and grew up, as did most of his many cousins, on his parents farm in the Hamrlik Postal District.

After leaving home, during the late 1930s Nick worked numerous jobs in many locations. During the autumn months he worked on the harvest gangs on farms across the prairies and southern Ontario. During the winter he worked in the logging camps, cutting pulp in locations such as Pine Falls, Manitoba, and Dryden and Kenora in northwestern Ontario. He also worked at Pickle Crow mines, also in northwestern Ontario.

Nick Kochan married Grace Grzenda on April 30, 1955 and together they raised six children: Patricia (1955), Rose(1957), Nicky (1959), Ted (1962), Irene (1966) and Adeline (1973).

In 1959 Nick and Grace moved to their new farm, of which all the buildings were constructed by Nick himself. Together they operated the farm for 33 years. Grace was very much involved. Whether it was taking care of the children, preparing large meals for the farm hands, or helping in the fields and around the farm, Grace was always there helping out.

Carpentry was a passion for Nick, and after retiring from farming in 1988 he took up furniture making, and fashioned many superb pieces using carefully selected oak trees found on the farm, without pattern or expensive tools, just a vision and his hands. Nick and Grace also enjoyed travelling in their retirement to places in Canada and the USA.

Nick passed away on January 28, 1997 at the age of 73 and was laid to rest at the Hamrlik Community Cemetery. Grace currently enjoys good health and continues to live in her retirement home in Poplarfield, Manitoba.



Mike Kochan

Mike Kochan was born November 26, 1927 in Hamrlik. He was the fourth of Katherine & Mike Kochan's six children. Mike attended nearby Leeland School as a child.

When he left home like many of his cousins and friends, he travelled to northwestern Ontario where he found work in Dryden cutting pulp for the paper mill. After eight years in Dryden, at the tender age of 26, he tragically drowned on July 19, 1953. He had been enjoying a Sunday morning swim with friends at Sandy Beach, two miles east of Dryden, Ontario when he disappeared under the waters of Wabigoon Lake. He was well liked and had many friends. His loss was a blow to all who knew him, no less so to his fiance.

He was laid to rest near other family members at the Hamrlik Community Cemetery.

Peter Kochan was born in Hamrlik, Manitoba, March 2nd, 1930. He attended Leeland School.

Leaving home at the age of 17, Peter worked for a time on a tobacco farm near Toronto. He also worked at Dryden, Ontario and Pine Falls, Manitoba cutting pulp.

Returning to Hamrlik he farmed from 1960 to 1979. On August 6, 1960 he married Bernice Marko and together they raised two sons, Gary (born 1961) and Wayne (born 1964).

Peter and Bernice operated a mixed farm for 19 years until he tragically and suddenly passed away on October 10, 1979 at the age of 49. He was laid to rest at the Hamrlik Community Cemetery. Bernice continues to farm and live in the Poplarfield area, as does Gary Kochan and his family. Wayne and family live only 13 miles away in Fisher Banch.





Olga Kochan


Olga was born on June 29, 1939. She moved to Winnipeg, Manitoba in 1953 where she attended Hugh John MacDonald School.





The Origin of the Ledochowski Family in Europe and their Coat-of-Arms

The Ledochowski family was and is well known for its deep spirit of faith and eminently Catholic life... mention being first made of them in the early history of the evangelization of Poland.

The origin of the coat-of-arms is significative of the family character. The legend runs that, about the year 975, a certain Halka was sent by the Ruthenian Grand Duke Wlodimir to the Court of Constantinople to learn the Christian religion. Attracted by the splendour of the Greek rite, on his return to court he advised the Grand Duke and his people to embrace Christianity. When the courtiers present jeered him and at the religion he praised, Halka traced a circle around himself, with three crosses in the centre, and, placing his trust in God, he challenged to combat, fought with, and overcame those who had insulted him. There upon, the Grand Duke gave him as a crest a golden circle on a blue ground with three crosses in the centre forming a triangle.

Nestor Halka (a descendent of the original convert Halka), who lived in the fifteenth century, received from the Lithuanian Prince Casimir (afterwards King of Poland) the estate of 'Ledochow' (in 1457) and added the family name that of Ledochowski, as many others did who adopted the name of the estate given to them by the Prince.

Over the years, many members of the Ledochowski family distinquished themselves militarily in defense of their country and religiously with their strong faith and service to the church. Some, for their deeds were granted land estates and noble titles. In these cases, additional elements, such as a nine pointed crown (to signify the title of Count) as well as two knights in armor, flanking the coat-of-arms were added. At different times and for different branches of the family, the coat of arms varied slightly.

However, it is in the Latin phrase that rests below the coat-of arms which speaks to the family's strength and faith - "My Life for God and Country".




In the spring of 1903 Gregory Ledochowski (47), his wife Anne (Lytwyn) (43) with their six children, left Przemysl, Poland, for Canada with the dream of creating a new and better life. By summer, a homestead had been selected, (SE 2-22-1W), located 5 miles east and 2 miles south of the present community of Poplarfield in what became known as the Hamrlik postal district. As the children grew up, each took homesteads of their own in the immediate and neighbouring vicinity. From this initial foothold in an isolated wilderness of bush, swamp and stone, by sheer sweat of their brow and unbending perseverance, the family prospered and grew, to include 51 grandchildren and over 100 great-grandchildren. Today, the descendants of Gregory and Anne reside throughout Manitoba, Canada and the United States, representing all walks of life. Pride of work and perseverance continues to be a family trait.

Erected on July 26, 2003 by the family in grateful recognition of Gregory and Anne's courage, faith, and strength, on the 100th anniversary of their arrival in Canada.




















